Background/Discussion

Per state law, the Board has until December 15th to adopt a budget and set the mill levy for the 2024 fiscal year. A proposed budget was introduced by Staff on October 11, 2023 at a public hearing. The attached budget document reflects changes discussed in Board workshops and regular Board meetings over the past several months.

Also included is the Certification of Property Taxes (setting the mill levy) and the Lease Purchase Agreement for the town hall copier/printer.

The General Fund, Conservation Trust Fund, Water Fund and Sewer Fund Operating Budgets are all balanced. We are spending in reserves for capital expenditures/projects for 2024.

I would like to let you know that legislation has changed recently which does require that the County Assessor's office provide us with the final certification of values for the Mill Levy on 1/3/2024. We have until 1/20/2024 to deliver our mill levies to the Board of County Commissioners. The 2024 budget has been prepared with the preliminary certification of values. If the final certification of values is different in January, then you will see a budget amendment and revised mill levy certification at the first meeting in 2024.

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the Town of Mancos has appointed the Town Administrator to prepare and submit a proposed budget to said governing body at the proper time; and

WHEREAS, Heather Alvarez, Town Administrator has submitted a proposed budget to this governing body on October 11, 2022 for its consideration; and

WHEREAS, upon due and proper notice, published or posted in accordance with the law, said proposed budget was open for inspection by the public at a designated place, a public hearing was held on October 11, 2023 and interested taxpayers were given the opportunity to file or register any objections to said proposed budget; and

WHEREAS, whatever increases may have been made in the expenditures, like increases were added to the revenues or planned to be expended from reserves/fund balances so that the budget remains in balance as required by law; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Mancos, has adopted the annual budget in accordance with the Local Government Budget Law on December 13, 2023; and

WHEREAS, the amount of money necessary to balance the budget for general operating purposes from property tax revenue is \$124,178; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF MANCOS,COLORADO:

Section 1. For purposes of meeting the operational and capital needs of the general fund in the 2024 budget year, there is hereby levied a tax of 9.443 mills upon each dollar of total valuation for assessment of all taxable property with the Town for the tax year 2023 and the budget year 2024. The Town Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to certify the Town of Mancos mill levy to the Montezuma County Commissioners as determined herein and set based upon the final certification of valuation from the County Assessor.

Section 2. That the budget as submitted, amended, and summarized by fund, hereby is approved and adopted as the budget of the Town of Mancos for the year stated above.

Section 3. That the budget hereby approved and adopted shall be signed by Heather Alvarez, Town Administrator and made a part of the public records of the Town.



Following the SGM and Town staff conference call on October 5th, 2023, SGM is pleased to present this proposal for professional services related to the Riverside Addition Subdivision water and sewer relocation planning at 1st Street and Montezuma Avenue. SGM initially compiled easement exhibits from title records research. The next step we recommend is land survey to verify monuments, boundaries, topography, and utilities in this subdivision. Please see the following scope and cost estimates to complete the work:

Task 1 – Land Survey

- Perform Boundary Searches on approximately 9-12 properties to attempt to resolve the location of

WHEREAS, Section 13.01.040 of the Town of Mancos Municipal Code authorizes the Mayor and Town Board of Trustees, by Resolution from time to time to adjust fees for making a new connection to the potable water distribution system (herein after "distribution system") and sanitary sewer collection system (herein after "collection system"); and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Board of Trustees recognize that infill and growth of the Town of Mancos (herein after "Town") is inevitable and wishes to make a proactive response to this eventuality; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Board of Trustees recognize that the connection fees to the Town distribution and collection system have not been adjusted since 2023 to reflect the increasing cost of renovating the water and wastewater treatment facilities; and,

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Board of Trustees recognize that each new connection to the distribution and collection system causes an additional loading factor to be placed on the Water Treatment Plant (herein after "WTP") and Wastewater Treatment Plant (herein after "WWTP") and recognizes that the cumulative result of increasing the loading placed on the WTP and WWTP will eventually necessitate that the WTP and WWTP and associated works will need to be expanded at an equal rate; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Town Board of Trustees did adjust the connection fees to the Town distribution system to \$6,422.00 and the connection to the Town collection system to \$6,422.00 by Resolution 2 Series 2023 and in accordance with the percent change of combined Denver/Aurora/Lakewood Consumer Price Index of 2022; and

WHEREAS, Resolution 16 Series 2006 directs that the Town of Mancos Mayor and Board of Trustees shall at the first regularly scheduled meeting of the Town of Mancos Board of Trustees adjust the cost of a connection to the Town distribution system and shall adjust the cost of a connection to the Town collection system; and

WHEREAS the estimated average percent change of the Denver/Aurora/Lakewood Consumer Price Index for the year 2023 is 5.0%.

2. Additionally, with regard to water rates, the cost per increment of 1,000 gallons beyond the initial 6,000 gallon minimum and up to 8,000 gallons is \$2.00 per 1,000 gallons. The cost per increment of 1,000 gallons beyond 8,000 and up to 10,000 gallons is \$4.00 per 1,000 gallons. The cost per increment of 1,000 gallons beyond 10,000 gallons is \$8.00 per 1,000 gallons.

3. Additionally, with regard to commercial and churches/schools/government sewer rates, the cost per increment of 1,000 gallons beyond the initial 6,000 gallon minimum and up to 8,000 gallons is \$2.00 per 1,000 gallons. The cost per increment of 1,000 gallons beyond 8,000 and up to 10,000 gallons is \$4.00 per 1,000 gallons. The cost per increment of 1,000 gallons beyond 10,000 gallons and up to 30,000 gallons is \$8.00 per 1,000 gallons.

4. Additionally, Mancos Municipal Code 13-1-220(d) late charge penalty is unchanged at \$10.00.

5. Additionally, Mancos Municipal Code 13-1-220(g) turn off/turn on at property owner request is unchanged at \$30.00.

6. Additionally, Mancos Municipal Code 13-1-220(h) returned check charge is unchanged at \$35.00.
